- About 150 couples get married in Las Vegas each day.
- In 1899 Charles Fey invented a slot machine named the Liberty Bell. In 1999 Nevada had 205,726 slot machines, one for every 10 residents.

AREA PROFILE

Carson Valley is located in Douglas County, in the western portion of Nevada bordered by Lyon County, Carson City, and the state of California. Carson Valley comprises the towns of Minden (the County seat), Gardnerville, and Genoa. Douglas County was established in 1861 and encompasses 751 square miles, it is the third smallest county within the state, but the fifth most populated. The county has grown 177% over the last 20 years. The Valley is connected to Lake Tahoe by an 11-mile drive on SR 207 (Kingsbury Grade). Average elevation for the Valley is 4,750 feet above sea level, and Lake Tahoe's average elevation (Lake level) is 6,210 feet above sea level.

Founder: Lawrence Gilman
Year: 1879
Name: Named for John and Mary Gardner, an English born couple who moved to Carson Valley in 1864, and not for Matthew C. Gardner as previously thought.
Fun Fact: The broad sprawling pastures and open spaces of the whole Carson Valley were once part of a territory in Utah.

Founder: H.F. Dangberg, Jr.
Year: 1905
Name: Named after Minden, Germany, near the birthplace of H.F. Dangberg, Sr. H.F. Dangberg, Jr. had a vision of community and culture when he planned Minden. Minden Park was and is the center of this Carson Valley town.
Fun Fact: Hollywood star Clark Gable married his fifth wife, sugar heiress Kay Spreckels, July 12, 1955 at the Minden home of Justice of the Peace G.W. "Walt" Fisher.

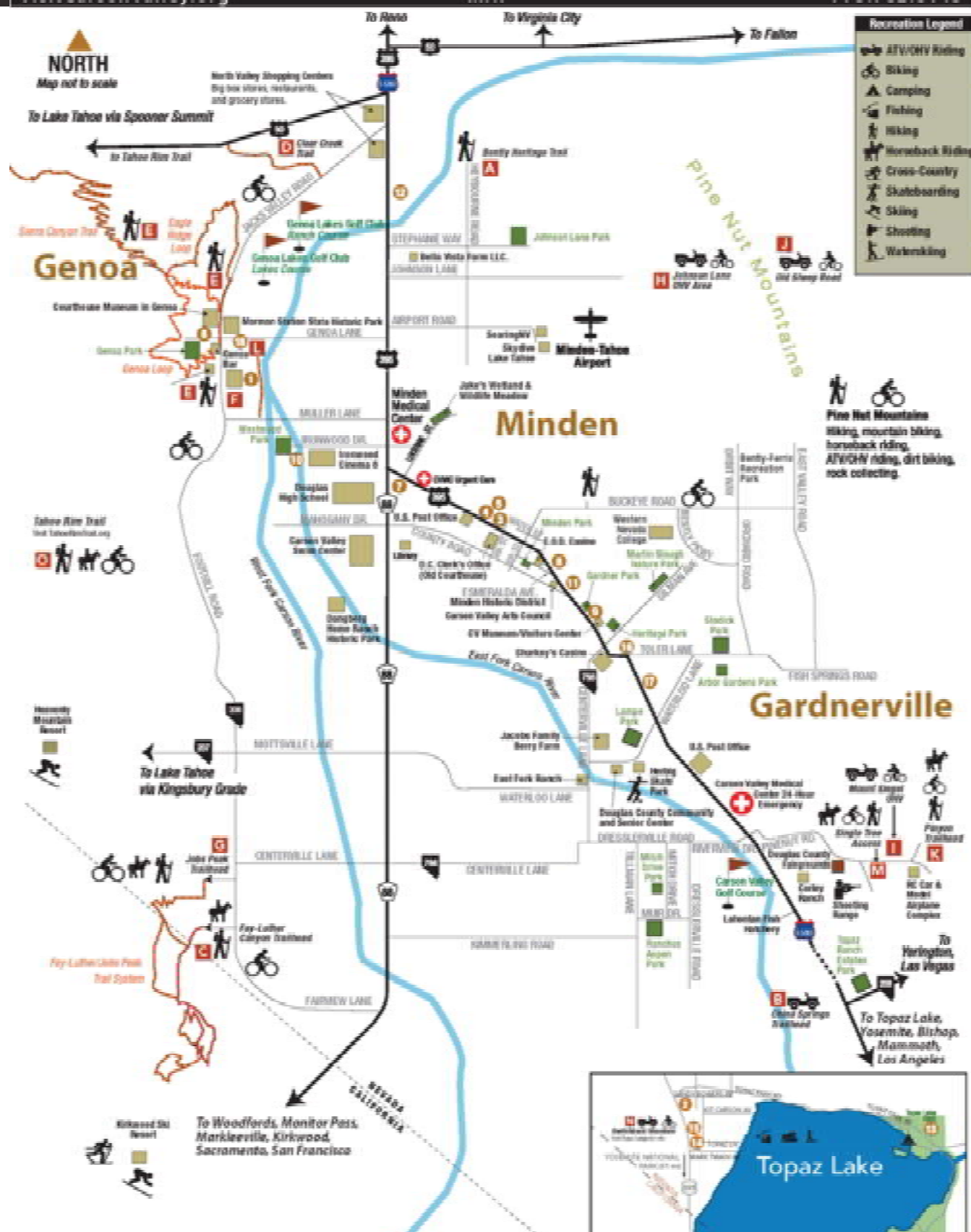
Founder: John Reese
Year: 1851
Name: The first recorded settlement in Nevada was originally named Mormon Station, then renamed Genoa in 1855 after the birthplace of Christopher Columbus.
Fun Fact: Genoa was the eastern terminus of frontier mailman John "Snowshoe" Thompson's route between 1856 and 1876. Thompson was the first man to ski the Tahoe backcountry and the same peaks that make up our world famous ski resorts, Heavenly Mountain Resort, Sierra-at-Tahoe and Kirkwood Mountain Resort.

HISTORY OF CARSON VALLEY



Carson Valley has a rich historical heritage dating back to the 1850s, when it became one of the favored stopping places for immigrants in wagons and on horseback. Today, you can travel back in time by visiting any of the local historical sites or taking some of the tours. For a self-guided tour map, contact the Carson Valley Chamber of Commerce & Visitors Authority.

Gardnerville

In 1879, the Gardnerville Hotel, blacksmith shop and a saloon were built along the new road running north and south (Highway 395). Here in the center of the hay and grain-producing community, Gardnerville was born. Gardnerville is named after John M. Gardner whose homestead dated from 1861.

Carson Valley Museum & Cultural Center

1477 Hwy 395, Gardnerville 775.782.2555

Built in 1915 as Douglas County's high school. Today it is a museum and cultural center with exhibits related to the history and heritage of Carson Valley. Gifts shop, art gallery, rest area with picnic tables, and public restrooms.

Carson Valley Hospital

1466 Hwy 395 (Logan Building)

The elegant brick Victorian was built in 1914 as a hospital by Dr. Hawkins. Later it became a boarding house and private residence. Today tenants report that a friendly ghost resides here.

Genoa

Genoa, the oldest town in Nevada, was settled by John Reese in 1851.

Courthouse Museum in Genoa

2304 Main St., Genoa 775.782.4325

Built in 1865 and rebuilt in 1910. After the county seat was moved to Minden in 1916, it became a school house. Today it is a museum with many displays that reflect the history and heritage of the area.

Mormon Station State Park

A replica of the original trading post and fort built on the site in 1851 by John Reese. Picnic tables and public restrooms.

Genoa Community Church

182 Nixon St., Genoa 775.782.8696

The present structure was built to replace the church that was lost in the fire of 1910. Genoa Town Office, Visitors

Center and Old Town Fire House (Town Hall/ Raycraft Dance Hall). On Main St., between Carson St. & Mill St., Genoa.

Genoa Bar / Livingston's Exchange

2282 Main St., Genoa 775.782.3870

Nevada's oldest thirst parlor, dating from the 1850s. Built by J.A. Livingston as Livingston's Exchange. You can still get a tall cool one at the bar today!

Jacks Valley

In 1853, R.T. Hawkins filed the first land claim in this small valley just north of Genoa. A small community grew around the claim. In the 1860s it was a stop on the Pony Express Trail.

Minden

H.F. Dangberg, founder of Dangberg Land and Livestock Company, established Minden in 1905 to provide terminal facilities for the Virginia & Truckee Railroad. Minden is named after the German town near Dangberg's birth place.

Douglas County Courthouse

1625 8th St., Minden 775.782.9961

The Nevada Legislature voted to move the county seat to Minden in 1916. The courthouse was designed by F.J.

DeLongchamps and built on a lot deeded from Dangberg Land Company.

Minden Inn

Esmeralda St. & 4th St., Minden

Currently the Douglas County Offices, the building was designed by F.J. DeLongchamps in 1917.

Minden Park

Esmeralda St. & 6th St., Minden

Built in 1906, the park became the "town square" for the first residential section of Minden. Picnic tables and public restrooms.

Topaz

Located south of Gardnerville on the Nevada-California border, Topaz Lake was created to provide irrigation for

farmers in the Wellington and Smith Valley area and has evolved into a recreation area for boating, fishing and water skiing.

Pony Express Trail & Emigrant Trail

When you are travelling down Jacks Valley and Foothill Roads, you are following the old Carson Branch of the Emigrant Trail and the historic Pony Express Trail. Settlers who made their homes in Carson County, Utah Territory, used this same route to enter the valley.

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA, RENO

The University of Nevada, Reno is the state's historic flagship institution of higher education. The University has a student enrollment of more than 19,000, including about 3,200 graduate students, and a total budget of nearly \$500 million.

The University provides a broad range of programs and degree options, ranging from baccalaureate degrees in more than 75 disciplines to more than 100 graduate-degree programs at the master's and doctoral level. The University of Nevada School of Medicine is a vital component of the University, with campuses in both of Nevada's major urban centers, Las Vegas and Reno, and a health network that extends to much of rural Nevada.

The University of Nevada was founded in 1874 in Elko as the state's first institution of higher education. Relocated to Reno in 1887, the University remained the state's only institution of higher education for 75 years. The first building on the Reno campus, Morrill Hall, is still in use today, and the campus has grown from a small cluster of buildings surrounding a central quadrangle (modeled after Thomas Jefferson's design for the University of Virginia), to a 250-acre site just north of downtown Reno. The University is one of eight institutions of higher education governed by the Nevada System of Higher Education.

The University has more than 145 undergraduate degree programs, and more than 150 graduate degree programs (57 master's, 80 doctoral and 24 professional graduate programs) from which students may choose. New majors approved recently include Atmospheric Sciences, Environmental Science, Forest and Rangeland Management, Wildlife Ecology, and Computer and Information Engineering. The University is also in the process of adding new Ph.D. programs in Mathematics, Statistics, and Geography, and a new interdisciplinary undergraduate program in Environmental Studies.

The tuition for Nevada resident undergraduates is among the lowest in the western United States and is a reflection of the Board of Regents' and state legislature's policy to provide access to as many Nevada high school graduates as are qualified. For example, the resident undergraduate tuition and fees total \$8,798 a year, which is lower than all but one of 15 western states. Non-resident undergraduate tuition and fees total \$25,340 a year, which is at the median for the western states.

Coupled with its status as a land-grant institution, the University necessarily has a statewide mission and boasts programs and activities in all 17 counties of the state. It has more than 700 employees outside the Reno area, most of them in Las Vegas. It plays a critical role in the promotion of health throughout the state through its Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health.

The University's athletics programs compete in NCAA Division I as part of the Mountain West Conference. The University fields competitive teams in 18 sports, with six men's sports and ten women's sports teams offering scholarships.

TRANSPORTATION

Gardnerville, Genoa and Minden are 16 miles south of Carson City. US Highway 395 and Highway 50 provide easy access to major western markets. While there is no rail services in Carson Valley; Southern Pacific, Union Pacific, and Amtrak services are available in the Reno/Sparks area.

The Carson City Airport is located 20.5 miles north of Gardnerville, Genoa and Minden.

The airport is a public facility serving the general aviation needs of the area. The airport has a 5,900 foot runway, complemented by a full parallel taxiway. Hanger space, tie-down, fuel and other services are available. Carson City

Airport is not a major passenger plane facility, accessible mostly by small aircraft. However, the Reno-Tahoe International Airport is only 50 miles away in Reno. Greyhound offers regional bus service through Carson City and the Pride bus system offers daily commuter services between Reno, Carson City, and other rural communities. JAC, Just Around Carson, also offers local bus service. Truck freight, taxi services and rental car service are also available locally.

Summer is a great time to hike or ride trails along creeks and rivers to refresh your spirit and your legs. Water activities from fishing to paddle boarding to lake cruises will never disappoint. Jump out of your comfort zone with skydiving, or enjoy a round of foot golf with the family. No matter where you go, the view is fantastic!

Carson Valley is also historic; museums, historic buildings and ranches introduce you to the culture of the West. Walking tours of Genoa, Minden and Gardnerville bring that history to life.

You can spend days visiting historic sites and museums, steeping yourself in the lives of the early settlers. Discover detailed information on Kit Carson and Snowshoe Thompson, the Pony Express, and the Emigrant Trail. The town of Genoa, originally named Mormon Station, is the oldest permanent non-native settlement in Nevada founded in 1851.

It boasts many historic buildings, a wonderful museum, and a park featuring a stockade. In Gardnerville, the Museum and Cultural Center is a marvelous place to spend an afternoon, learning more about unique aspects of early life in the Carson Valley. You can experience the ranch life of the old west at the Dangberg Ranch Historic Park.

Gaming is a Nevada staple and you can find it here in Carson Valley. Many casinos host live concerts throughout the week, as well as providing stellar food. Local restaurants and bars feature live entertainment, and have an event venue boasting stars like Wynonna Judd and Merle Haggard.

The food in Carson Valley matches the air: fresh, new and uplifting. Whether it be the granddaddy of valley dining — the JT Basque Bar & Dining Room with its traditional Basque country cuisine — or the beautiful overhaul of the old Minden Flour Milling Co., into the Bently Heritage Estate Distillery with its locally sourced water and grains, there are a wide variety of local options for you to find a stellar meal unique to Carson Valley and perfect to satisfy your appetite.

In a time when women were expected to be homemakers, wives, and mothers, Eliza Cook defied the odds to become a doctor, community leader, and political activist. Dr. Eliza Cook practiced medicine for 37 years, retiring in 1921 at the age of 65. She traveled by horse and buggy, practicing medicine "from Genoa to Markleeville." Dr. Cook built a small house near Mottsville in 1911, where she lived until her death in 1947. The house is now part of Laura Springs Antique store.

Genoa Historic Ghost Tours

Learn about the rich history of Nevada's oldest town, where the ghosts help tell the story. Come walk with us through the historic town of Genoa – Nevada's oldest settlement. HIKING, BIKING & OFF ROAD TRAILS

Carson Valley is an outdoor adventure paradise, with 15 trails to explore, you will never get bored!



Bently Heritage Trail

Explore 5 miles of hiking trail at Kirman Field at Carson Valley, where the Carson River winds in braided channels, supporting willows and wetlands that sustain many birds and animals.



China Springs Trail

About 17 miles of U.S. Forest Service roads and rocky jeep trails can be found at this OHV area. These are just rocky roads, not motorcycle trails. You will not find any single track, but the scenery makes this a good choice for a slow ATV loop or camping trip.



Fay-Luther/Jobs Peak Ranch Trail System

The Fay-Luther/Jobs Peak Ranch Trail System offers a family-friendly, 8.8 mile network of linear and loop trails.



Clear Creek Trail

The Clear Creek Trail is a 10.5-mile trail starting at Jacks Valley Trailhead next to Jack Valley Elementary School.



Genoa Trail System

This trail system includes 16 miles of non-motorized trails in the Genoa area. This includes the Genoa Loop, Sierra Canyon, Eagle Ridge Loop and Discovery Trails



Genoa Vista Trail

This paved 1.3 mile trail connects 1862 David Walley's Resort Hot Springs & Spa to the town of Genoa.



Jobs Peak Ranch Trail

The trailhead is located on Foothill Road, about 4 miles south of Kingsbury Grade and follows an easement through a private development.



Johnson Lane OHV Access

Miles of sandy ATV trails as well as several steep hill climbs and play areas. The main staging area is large and flat with plenty of room for large toy haulers or RVs.



Mount Siegel OHV Trail

This area is mainly rolling hills, sand washes and a variety of ATV trails with mountain views.



Old Sheep Road

This area offers about 15 miles of fire roads, a few side trails and a very long sand wash. If you stay on the trail long enough it will lead you to the old sheep ranch which makes for a nice resting point.



Pinyon Trail

This trail wraps around a large hill with continuous views of the Pine Nut and Carson Range. This trail offers a round-trip distance of 5.2 miles.



River Fork Ranch

There are two trails at River Fork Ranch, the 0.75 mile East Brockless Loop and the 2.0 mile West Fork Trail.



Single Tree Access Trail

This trail into the Pine Nut Mountains is marked by a large tree in the middle of the parking lot.



Switchback Mountain

Switchback Mountain offers a variety of off-road trails.



Tahoe Rim Trail-Lake Tahoe

The 165-mile Tahoe Rim Trail loops around Lake Tahoe and can be accessed from Kingsbury Grade and Spooner Summit with great views of the Carson Valley between Stagecoach and Monitor's Pass.

DISC GOLF

Pinenut Disc Golf Course

The course was established in 2018. Pinenut course is in the foothills of the Pine Nuts Mountain range and has moderate elevation changes. Terrain is Juniper and Pinyon pines. Course provides fantastic views of the Eastern Sierras and the Carson Valley course has a good mix of technical and open tee shots. The course provides great hole variety, playing through trees as well as open areas. Moderately hilly and lightly wooded. Course has 18 holes/baskets.

Zephyr Cove Disc Golf Course

Zephyr Cove disc golf course is located in Zephyr Cove Park on Lake Tahoe's east shore. The course was established in 1998 and is very hilly and moderately wooded. The course has 18 holes/baskets with a lot of elevation change and fun obstacles.

NEVADA STATE PARKS

Camping, fishing, hiking, swimming, nature study, star-gazing—not your thing? How about mountain biking, horseback riding, boating, water skiing, snowshoeing, ice-skating? Choose your favorite outdoor activity and Nevada State Parks will provide a place for it. Nevada's 23 state parks, recreation areas and historic sites are stretched across terrains as diverse as alpine forests and bone-dry deserts. Among them are natural lakes and man-made reservoirs, such as world-famous, 22 mile long Lake Tahoe or the much smaller Echo Canyon and its 35-acre reservoir.

Other parks provide glimpses into the past. Valley of Fire is one of the state's oldest, with 3,000-year-old petroglyphs carved in sandstone and breathtaking views of the maroon-colored rock formations created during the age of the dinosaurs. Mormon Station in Genoa and the Old Las Vegas Mormon Fort feature replicas of 19th-century fortifications and visitor centers explaining regional history.

Many campgrounds and RV facilities are open all year, depending on the weather. You can even stay in a yurt at Cave Lake State Park near Ely. Trailheads are well marked, and facilities at many parks include RV dump stations, showers and day use facilities for groups.
