

Seattle Relocation Guide: Moving to Seattle for Work

Moving to Seattle for a job? I've done this three times myself, so I know exactly what you're dealing with. New city, no connections, trying to figure out where to live while juggling work stress and life logistics. This guide covers what actually matters when you're relocating to Seattle, not the tourist brochure version.



Why People Move to Seattle

Let's be real. Most people move to Seattle for work. Amazon, Microsoft, Google, and hundreds of other tech companies are hiring constantly. The job market is strong, wages are high, and Washington has no state income tax, which means you keep more of your paycheck than you would in California or Oregon.

But once you're here, you realize Seattle offers more than just a paycheck. You've got mountains an hour east, ocean an hour west, and a city that actually functions in between. The weather gets a bad rap, but the reality is milder than most of the country. No brutal winters, no oppressive summers, just a lot of gray drizzle from November to March that you learn to ignore.

The Job Market Reality

- **250,000+ Amazon employees** in the Seattle area make it the company's largest hub
- **Microsoft** employs over 50,000 in the Puget Sound region
- **Tech jobs** dominate but healthcare, aerospace (Boeing), and biotech also hire heavily
- **Median household income: \$85,000+** well above national average
- **No state income tax** which effectively increases your take-home pay by 5-10% compared to California

What You're Trading

What you gain: Strong job market, no income tax, outdoor access, mild climate, good coffee, functional transit in some areas.

What you give up: Affordable housing (median home price around \$800K-\$850K), traffic is terrible, making friends takes effort (the "Seattle Freeze" is real), and yes, it rains a lot in winter.

Seattle Neighborhoods for Relocators

Where you live in Seattle matters more than in most cities because traffic is genuinely awful and location determines your entire daily experience. Here's the breakdown for people moving here for work.

Capitol Hill

Best for: Young professionals who want walkable urban living and nightlife

Housing: \$500K-\$900K for condos, \$800K-\$1.5M+ for houses

Commute to Amazon SLU: 10-15 minutes by bus or bike

Commute to Microsoft Redmond: 35-45 minutes (light rail + bus or drive)

What's here: Bars, restaurants, coffee shops, Capitol Hill light rail station, very walkable (Walk Score: 93/100)

Ballard

Best for: People who want neighborhood feel with urban amenities

Housing: \$700K-\$1.2M for homes, \$500K-\$800K for condos

Commute to Amazon SLU: 20-25 minutes by bus

Commute to Microsoft Redmond: 45-60 minutes (bus to light rail or drive via 520)

What's here: Breweries, Ballard Locks, farmers market, Golden Gardens beach, Nordic Heritage Museum

Queen Anne

Best for: Split personality neighborhood - Lower Queen Anne is young and walkable, Upper Queen Anne is established and residential

Housing: \$600K-\$900K for condos in Lower QA, \$1M+ for houses in Upper QA

Commute to Amazon SLU: 8-12 minutes walk from Lower QA, 10-15 minutes drive from Upper QA

Commute to Microsoft Redmond: 30-40 minutes (drive or bus/light rail)

What's here: Seattle Center, Space Needle, Kerry Park views, walkable Lower QA, quiet residential Upper QA

More Neighborhoods to Consider

South Lake Union (SLU)

Best for: Amazon employees who want a 5-minute commute

Housing: \$600K-\$1M+ for condos (mostly high-rises)

Commute to Amazon: 0-10 minutes walk (you're already there)

Commute to Microsoft Redmond: 30-40 minutes drive

What's here: Amazon headquarters, Whole Foods, REI, Lake Union Park, streetcar to downtown. Very urban, mostly new construction.

Fremont

Best for: People who want quirky neighborhood character

Housing: \$650K-\$950K for homes, \$500K-\$750K for condos

Commute to Amazon SLU: 12-18 minutes by bus or bike

Commute to Microsoft Redmond: 40-50 minutes (bus to light rail or drive)

What's here: Fremont Troll, breweries, Sunday Market, Burke-Gilman Trail, PCC Natural Markets, Google and Adobe offices nearby

Eastside Suburbs: Bellevue, Redmond, Kirkland

Best for: Microsoft employees or people who want suburban living with newer construction

Housing: \$800K-\$1.5M+ in Bellevue/Redmond, slightly less in Kirkland

Commute to Microsoft Redmond: 10-20 minutes drive

Commute to Amazon SLU: 30-40 minutes (drive or bus/light rail)

What's here: Shopping centers, parks, newer housing, less urban density, easier parking. Bellevue is becoming its own tech hub.

West Seattle

Best for: People who want a house with a yard and don't mind the commute

Housing: \$600K-\$950K for homes

Commute to Amazon SLU: 25-30 minutes (when bridge is functional)

Commute to Microsoft Redmond: 50-60 minutes

What's here: Alki Beach, more single-family homes than most Seattle neighborhoods, community feel, somewhat isolated by geography

📌 **Critical note:** Don't pick a neighborhood based on Zillow. Traffic patterns, transit access, and commute times vary wildly. A 20-minute Google Maps estimate can easily become 50+ minutes during rush hour on a rainy Tuesday. I help relocators understand real commute patterns, not theoretical ones.

Seattle Weather Reality Check

Yes, it rains. No, it's not as bad as you think. Here's the actual deal:

What the Weather Is Actually Like

- **Summer (June-September):** Spectacular. Sunny, dry, 70-80°F. Long daylight hours (16+ hours in June). This is why people live here.
- **Fall (October-November):** Starts getting gray and drizzly. Temps in the 50s. Leaves change, but it's not dramatic like New England.
- **Winter (December-March):** Gray, drizzly, 40-50°F. Rarely freezes. Snow is unusual in the city. It's not heavy rain, it's constant mist. You learn to ignore it.
- **Spring (April-May):** Unpredictable. Could be sunny, could be rainy. Temps in the 50s-60s. Flowers bloom everywhere.

What This Means for You

Seattle gets less total annual rainfall than New York or Miami. It just comes in the form of constant drizzle spread across more days instead of heavy downpours. You will not melt. Buy a decent rain jacket, embrace indoor coffee culture in winter, and appreciate that you don't have to shovel snow or survive hurricane season.

The lack of extreme weather is actually one of Seattle's best features. No 100°F heat waves, no -20°F winters, no tornadoes, no hurricanes. It's remarkably temperate year-round.

Cost of Living Breakdown

Housing

This is where Seattle gets expensive. Median home prices hover around **\$800K-\$850K**. Condos in desirable neighborhoods like Capitol Hill or Downtown run \$500K-\$900K. Single-family homes in popular areas like Ballard or Queen Anne are \$900K-\$1.5M+.

Rentals average \$2,000-\$3,000+ for a decent apartment, more if you want a newer building or prime location.

The tradeoff: No state income tax means you keep 5-10% more of your paycheck compared to California. For high earners, this partially offsets housing costs. Run the numbers based on your actual salary.

Everything Else

- **Utilities:** Moderate, thanks to hydroelectric power. Expect \$100-\$200/month for a typical apartment.
- **Groceries:** About 10-15% above national average. Farmers markets and local produce are good quality.
- **Dining out:** \$15-\$25 per person for casual, \$50-\$100+ for nicer places. Seattle has excellent restaurants.
- **Transportation:** Gas is expensive (\$4-\$5/gallon). ORCA card for transit is \$99/month. Parking downtown is \$20-\$40/day.
- **Childcare:** If you have kids, expect \$1,500-\$2,500/month for daycare.

Getting Around Seattle

Transit

Seattle has light rail connecting SeaTac Airport to downtown, Capitol Hill, U District, and expanding to Bellevue and Redmond. It's clean, reliable, and useful if you live/work along the line.

Bus system is extensive but can be slow depending on traffic. ORCA card works on all transit.

Driving

Traffic is legitimately terrible. I-5 and I-405 are parking lots during rush hour. What should be a 20-minute drive can easily take an hour. Bridge traffic (520, I-90, West Seattle Bridge) adds unpredictability.

Strategy: Live near work or along transit lines. Flexible work schedules help. Many tech companies offer remote work options specifically because commuting sucks.

Biking

Seattle is bike-friendly with trails like Burke-Gilman (27 miles). Hills make some areas challenging. Weather is fine for biking most of the year if you have rain gear.

Making Friends in Seattle (The "Seattle Freeze")

The Seattle Freeze is real. People are polite but not particularly warm to newcomers. It takes effort to build a social circle here. This isn't personal, it's just how the culture works.

How to Actually Make Friends

- Join recreational leagues (softball, soccer, volleyball)
- Take classes (climbing gym, cooking, language)
- Attend meetups around hobbies or professional networking
- Volunteer for causes you care about
- Go to neighborhood events (farmers markets, street fairs)
- Be proactive. People won't reach out to you first.

It takes 6-12 months to build a solid friend group if you're actively trying. Don't expect instant connections.

What to Do in Seattle



Outdoor Activities

- **Hiking:** Rattlesnake Ledge, Mount Si, countless Cascade trails within 1-2 hours
- **Skiing/Snowboarding:** Stevens Pass, Crystal Mountain, Snoqualmie Pass all within 1.5-2 hours
- **Water:** Kayak Lake Union, paddleboard Green Lake, sail Puget Sound, ferry to San Juan Islands
- **Urban parks:** Discovery Park (534 acres), Washington Park Arboretum, Golden Gardens Beach
- **Biking:** Burke-Gilman Trail, Elliott Bay Trail, Alki Beach path



Food and Drink

- **Pike Place Market:** Fresh seafood, produce, flowers, tourists everywhere
- **Coffee:** Starbucks started here but local roasters (Espresso Vivace, Cafe Allegro, Anchorhead) are better
- **Breweries:** 50+ in Seattle, concentrated in Ballard and Fremont
- **Restaurants:** Excellent sushi, pho, Korean food in International District. Farm-to-table Pacific Northwest cuisine everywhere.



Sports

- Seahawks (NFL) - Lumen Field, insane fan culture
- Mariners (MLB) - T-Mobile Park
- Sounders (MLS) - passionate soccer fans
- Kraken (NHL) - newest team at Climate Pledge Arena
- Storm (WNBA) - perennial championship contenders

What Nobody Tells You Before You Move

- **Vitamin D matters**

Winter darkness and clouds mean you need supplements. Everyone takes them.

- **Rain gear, not umbrellas**

Locals don't use umbrellas. Get a good rain jacket.

- **The city shuts down for snow**

Even 2 inches causes chaos. Stock up on food if snow is forecasted.

- **Earthquake prep is real**

Seattle sits on fault lines. Have an emergency kit.

- **Amazon runs this city**

Their influence is everywhere, for better or worse.

- **Homelessness is visible**

Seattle has a significant homeless population, particularly downtown. It's been a contentious political issue for years.

- **Sales tax is high**

10.25% in Seattle. No income tax, but you pay at the register.

- **Everything closes early**

Compared to other major cities, Seattle shuts down by 10-11 PM on weeknights.

Timeline for Relocating to Seattle



3-6 Months Before Your Move

- Research neighborhoods online
- Get finances in order, check credit score
- Get pre-approved for a mortgage if buying
- Schedule initial consultation with me to discuss your needs



1 Month Before

- Finalize property selection (buy or rent)
- Complete inspections and paperwork if buying
- Set up utilities (Seattle City Light for electricity, Puget Sound Energy for gas if needed)
- Register car if you're bringing one (Washington requires this within 30 days)



2-3 Months Before

- Visit Seattle if possible (weekdays, not just weekends, to see real commute traffic)
- Narrow down 3-4 neighborhoods based on work location and lifestyle
- Start serious property search
- Line up movers



Move Week

- Close on property or sign lease
- Transfer utilities to your name
- Get Washington driver's license (required within 30 days of establishing residency)
- Register to vote
- Find a primary care doctor, dentist, etc.
