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Real Estate News

Median home sales prices are up 22% from January of last year statewide. In Carroll County the increase is 51% and Belknap County is 14%.

Average days on market fell in Carroll County by 55% to 39 days on market, and in Belknap County the average days on market fell by almost 59% to 30 days. In Grafton County the median sales price increased by 48%, with an average days on market of 45, a decline of 56% from January of 2020. Closed sales are up for all 3 counties as

compared to January of 2020.

December also showed a robust statewide increase in housing starts pointing to an active year for new construction, but higher material costs, especially lumber, and a limited supply of buildable lots will temper the number of new units.

What does this data mean? A strong market continues with high buyer demand and decreased listings.
